Emigrated from County Tyrone, Ulster, Ireland, to Lancaster County, Pennsylvania. The name McLean is also spelled McLane and McClaine in old records, according to C. H. Wiley in his Alamance Church Historical Address, 1879. The family McLean has its own Scottish Tartan. The McLean family and William Paisley, Sr., and his brother, John, emigrated together from County Tyrone, Ulster Plantation, in what is now Northern Ireland, to Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, in 1735-36. They were Ulster Scot Presbyterians, originally settlers from the Scottish Lowlands to the Ulster Plantation in Ireland in the early 1600s. John McLean may have been born in Scotland.
